THE REFORMATORY AT LAST.—Yesterday, at the Borough Court, Bradford, James Naylor, a lad who had a very narrow escape a few days ago of being sent to a reformatory institution, was placed at the bar, before Henry Brown, Esq. (Mayor), W. B. Addison, Esq., and S. Anderton. Esq., charged with stealing a top-coat. Benjamin Holmes, a boy, was with his milk-cart in Darley-street, Bradford, on Sunday morning, at the time, half-past nine o'clock, when Naylor was observed loitering about; he was absent about four minutes, and on his return missed his topcoat. Naylor, who is a most notorious thief, went to George-street on Sunday evening, and attempted to dispose of the coat to some boys; at last he found a customer in David Craven, a lad who borrowed a shilling of Jane Bee, a beerhouse-keeper in Frederick-street, and gave Naylor 10d. and a smock for it. As soon as the young thief got the money, he re-purchased his own jacket for 14d., having previously sold it for a penny. He was sentenced to three months' hard labour in Wakefield House of Correction, and ordered to be then transferred to the Reformatory at Mirfield for four years.
