SUICIDE.—On Friday afternoon, the 17th inst., a man was observed for a considerable time to be walking up and down the towing path of the river near to Raven's-wharf, Dewsbury. Towards evening he was seen to jump into the river, an alarm was given, and search made, but the body was not found till Saturday morning, when he was removed to the Raven's-wharf Inn, to await an inquest. The man was rather stout, with a good deal of whiskers under the chin, and dressed in cotton cord trousers, check smock, black silk handkerchief, and clogs.

SUICIDE.—T. Taylor, Esq. held an inquest yesterday (Monday), at the Raven's Wharf Inn, Dewsbury, on the body of a labouring man, named Wm. Thornton, who committed self-destruction by drowning himself on Friday last, near the Damstakes in the river Calder, at Dewsbury. Deceased was forty years of age, but not married, and was noticed to commit the rash act by two girls who were playing near Lockwood Mill. Verdict, "Drowned himself during temporary insanity."
