## HUDDERSFIELD.

SERIOUS RAILWAY COLLISION AT MIRFIELD.— Yesterday morning, about a quarter to twelve, as the Normanton and Manchester train (the Lancashire and Yorkshire Company), leaving Wakefield at fifteen minutes past eleven, was passing at a slow rate the engine-sheds at the Mirfield station, the London and North-Western train from Wakefield overtaking it, rushed into the Lancashire and Yorkshire train, and threw several carriages off the line, destroying the buffers and otherwise injuring the wheels. Although no loss of life has followed, and, as far as we can learn, no limbs have been broken, the bruises and contusions are numerous. From two eye-witnesses of the accident, we gather that the passengers in the Lancashire and Yorkshire train showed painful evidences of the results of the collision. The faces of many were sadly disfigured, the blood of the sufferers marking the track of the train, and in one case we hear that very severe injuries have been suffered in the head and breast of the victim. The guard of the London and North-Western train has also, we understand, been very severely dealt with. We are informed that the axle of the break-van of the Lancashire train broke before its entrance to the shed, and the guard had communicated with the engine-driver, who had pulled-up without injury.
