A MAN KILLED AT MIRFIELD.—On Monday afternoon, Henry Byewater, painter, was whitewashing the engine-house of the Britannia Mill, belonging to Mr. J. M. Johnson, near the Mirfield Railway Station, when it is supposed, through the scaffolding giving way, he was precipitated to the floor, a distance of thirty feet, and was killed. The left arm was broken and severely lacerated, and his neck was also dislocated. He was left by Nobles, the engine-tenter, at twenty minutes to six alive and doing his work, and on returning at six to start the engine, Nobles found him on the floor as stated. He leaves a wife and four small children.
