

A LEEDS FORTUNE-TELLER IN TROUBLE.—Yesterday, Mary Walker, a middle-aged woman, was placed in the dock of the Court-house, Dewsbury, on a charge of pretending to tell fortunes, at Mirfield, on the 20th of February. Three young women gave evidence to the effect that they went to the prisoner's house, and were promised by her handsome young men for husbands. The prisoner "foretold" that one of them would have three children, and "meet with many crosses." To one she said she would have many enemies. They gave her sixpence each. When before the bench the prisoner said she had told fortunes in order to get a little money. She was very poor. Supt. Martin said the poverty could not be denied, but she had been convicted at Leeds in 1864. The bench committed her to gaol for one month.
